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

The award will fund the ACR Materials Mobile, a mobile pop-up where busy educators can "shop" for high quality, new and gently used classroom supplies right on their campuses. The first project of its kind in Central Texas, the Materials Mobile will provide the materials educators need, exactly when they need them, at little to no cost, all while keeping tens of thousands of pounds of usable school supplies out of the landfill.

5 Tips for Traveling on a Budget This Summer

Traveling is a great way to enjoy new experiences, learn about the world, bond with your family and take a break from the monotony of long summer days. Since the cost of travel can be prohibitive, many families don't get away as frequently as they'd like or miss out on places they've dreamed of visiting. Fortunately, there are lots of ways to travel and explore the world without breaking the bank.

Compare Cost

With so many airlines, hotels and tours to choose from, planning a trip can be overwhelming. Thankfully, many websites simplify this by allowing you to enter your travel dates and preferences to compare prices and features from different companies. These websites are particularly helpful for comparing costs on a single website and keeping track of your findings. Many travel comparison sites also show ratings, so you don't waste your money on a seemingly good deal that turns out to be a bad deal. Search Smart

When searching online for travel deals, there are a few tricks to know. Many websites use cookies and can see when you've been searching for specific hotels or flights. There is some evidence, according to William McGee, aviation advisor for Consumer Reports, that pricing may be based in part on your search history. An easy fix is to clear the cookies in your browser before visiting the same travel website again, so the site cannot track you following specific companies, destinations or deals.

There are also many theories about the best time to book your flight, with the most common being on a Tuesday afternoon, six weeks before your trip. While this exact date is subject to debate, it does seem that airline fare sales tend to start on Tuesdays. Your best bet is to start checking fares early and pay attention to any patterns. Some airlines also have better deals if you book at least two weeks before your trip.

Road trip!

If you're traveling as a family, the cost of airline tickets for everyone adds up quickly. Depending on how far you plan to travel, a road trip might be a good option. Your journey can become part of your vacation. Gas for one car, which can hold everyone, will likely cost much less than airline tickets for multiple people. It can also be better for the planet. If you're feeling extra adventurous, rent an RV to save on both your travel and lodging costs (but do the math for the added fuel costs). You can typically find RV parks along any route for much

lower prices than staying in a hotel. It can also be a fun bonding experience for your family or group to travel this way.

Discounts and Deals

Websites like www.groupon.com and www.livingsocial.com offer significant discounts on specific travel deals. Because they only offer deals to particular places within a range of dates, this is a good option if you want to travel but you're flexible about destination and dates. Depending on your age and interests, some companies host trips and tours with lodging, attractions and travel costs included. Traveling with a tour group can result in deeper discounts than traveling alone. Topdeck and Contiki are popular group tour hosts that cater mainly to young adults and offer specific budget travel options. For all ages, Flash Pack and Austin Adventures are excellent choices.

Companies such as Costco or AAA also offer travel packages at discounted prices. By signing up for a free membership on certain websites, such as www.hotels.com you can earn free nights and get exclusive discounts on hotels.

Another way to reduce your travel cost is to save up money with a travel rewards credit card that caters to your vacation interests. Many airlines offer credit cards on which you can earn miles to redeem for future travel. Some specific travel destinations, like Disney World, also have credit cards you can use to earn rewards toward future vacation costs. Capital One and many other credit card companies also offer similar travel reward credit cards that provide greater travel flexibility.

Travel locally

It's easy to overlook sight-seeing activities and destination hot spots that are close to home. If you have the travel bug but lack the time or money for a big trip, do some research to see what opportunities and adventures you can find nearby for a weekend or day trip. This can save you a lot of money on travel and lodging expenses. Plus, it's easier to pack food for a short journey, which can also save you money instead of eating out. You might be surprised at what exciting new things you've been missing locally or nearby. Realize that with a little creativity and effort, traveling doesn't need to be out of reach just because of a small budget. 6 Ways to Learn Through Crafting

As we hit the dog days of summer, our family ends up spending a lot more time inside, trying to escape the heat. It's very easy for screen time to creep up when we're home so much, so to counteract the screen sirens, I often set out big bins of crafting supplies for when boredom hits. My kids enjoy crafting – both from kits and from their own imaginations – but what they don't realize is that they're also strengthening important skills and learning at the same time. Learning in the summer is a win-win in any parent's book!

How kids learn through crafting:

1. Fine motor skills. Fine motor skills are the ability to make small movements using the muscles in your hands and wrists. Good fine motor skills are imperative in school as those small muscles allow kids to have legible handwriting, use scissors properly, perform as expected in art and more. They also help our kids with important life skills like tying shoes, brushing teeth, buttoning clothing and using utensils to eat.

Kids need to do lots of activities to strengthen those small muscles in their hands and wrists and crafting provides ample opportunities to improve fine motor skills under the guise of fun. Painting, coloring, cutting, squishing playdough, picking up small objects and squeezing a glue bottle are just some examples of crafting that involve fine motor skills.

- 2. Math. Art might seem like the opposite of math, but in fact, many math concepts come into play when crafting. Sorting and counting art supplies by color or type, creating patterns in artwork, working with different geometric shapes, and measuring lengths and sizes of materials are just some of the ways math gets used when crafting.
- 3. Creativity. In today's scheduled world, kids rarely get the chance to let loose and dream. Crafting allows them to bring to life whatever they see in their imaginations. And, just like any other skill, practice makes better. The more your child taps into his or her imagination, the easier it becomes to do so. Fluid, creative thinking is great for problemsolving, which is a skill that translates extremely well to the real world.

- 4. Soft skills. Soft skills involve things like communication, collaboration, problem-solving and resilience. Crafting is a great small group activity - playdates with friends or siblings count! I love seeing my kids team up to make an art project together or even helping each other with tips and ideas. Working with the same materials requires kids to practice communication, sharing, collaboration and more. Teachers will thank you for helping your child to develop his or her soft skills as they make the classroom run more smoothly.
- 5. Self-regulation. Self-regulation is the act of understanding and managing your own behavior and reactions. Being able to understand and regulate behavior allows your child to control impulses, sit attentively in class, behave in prosocial ways with friends and others and manage emotions. Crafting and creating art can put the maker into a state of calm, much like meditation, allowing the body and mind to relax. When that happens, through repetition, the brain can create neural pathways allowing for quicker achievement of this state of calm.

Also, taking the time to slow down and disconnect from screens and the fast pace of life allows kids to tune into their inner thoughts and feelings. Crafting and art offer a fabulous way to explore and express those feelings, which is another way to help self-regulate and self-soothe.

6. Focus and concentration.

Completing a craft project from start to finish requires focus and concentration. Kids have to tune out distractions so they can pay attention to cutting, selecting beads or whatever action is necessary for their task. Being able to focus is a skill that takes practice, and crafting provides a fun opportunity to work on that skill. If your child selects a craft with specific instructions, he or she will need to pay attention and work methodically to complete the craft correctly. Being able to focus and concentrate are skills that will pay off for your child in the classroom, in extracurriculars and in life in general.

This summer when the kids are turning into screen zombies and you all need a little Zen break, give crafting a try. Your kids will have fun and (sneakily) strengthen a number of important skills.

Is it Bad to Swear in Front of Kids?

My husband swears in front of our children. He doesn't swear at our kids directly, but I'm still concerned. We have two boys, age, nine and eleven, and they've both gotten in trouble at school for using bad language during recess.

Some sources say hearing swear words is not harmful and helps children learn the nuances of society; however, as you've experienced, children who hear swear words are likely to repeat them in inappropriate places. This can have many consequences at school and in social groups. For instance, most parents don't want their children to play with kids who use swear words.

Your husband needs to make an effort to stop swearing around your children.

Here are some ideas to help:

- 1. Have a swear jar. When a family member says a swear word, he must put a certain amount of money in the jar. Let your children be the ones who remind you and your husband about expectations. Save up the money for a fun family outing.
- 2. Find other words to replace swearing. Look for words that might be on standardized tests. Enrich your family's vocabulary instead of limiting it. Make a list of funny, alternative phrases for your family to use when you're feeling frustrated and want to swear.
- 3. Get your husband to agree and post a sign in your home that says, "No swearing allowed."
- 4. Challenge your husband to see how many days he can refrain from swearing.
- 5. Model new ways to deal with frustrations and stress. As a family, practice various techniques for pausing, breathing and restarting a sentence with better word choices.
- 6. Praise kids for managing their emotions and using appropriate language.

Even after testing several of these heat-numbing treats, your family might be stuck making one of the most challenging decisions of the summer – what flavor to scoop. If you are in this chilly predicament, don't hesitate to order a generously shareable 10-scoop flight. Just be sure to grab enough spoons!

Same Story 3 Different Ways

I've recently been corrected about a longtime impression that I've held. Between you and me, I don't always receive correction gracefully, but in this instance, it opened up possibilities for thinking about how media and literature can come together for the good of kids.

I've never been a big fan of books that replicate what happens in a television show or movie. To me, these books seem both uncreative and unnecessary - why have a book tell the same story that a show did perfectly well?

That's where Dr. Sebastian Wren, Senior Program Coordinator at Literacy First of UT Austin, stepped in with some guidance for me. He trains AmeriCorps members to provide early literacy instruction to young readers, and he knows both the research on literacy and the minds of kids. "Actually," he said, "knowing the show may help a young reader figure out the words in the book, which can be very exciting."

Here's the tricky part for us non-literacy experts. If the reader is young and hasn't yet started to crack the code of reading, telling a story by flipping through a book can be a perfectly wonderful activity. In telling a child's version, she is relying on memory, imagination and the sense of how a book works, all of which are very important pre-literacy skills. That said, if a young reader is working on the actual task of reading strings of words and making meaning from them, we want to ensure she focuses on the words in front of her and not making substitutions based upon guesses or memory. Success comes when words are both read correctly and make sense to the reader. And when they match the story, the child already knows, it's time to celebrate! Conversely, if the child is clearly frustrated or substitutes words for what's on the page, she may not be ready for that level of difficulty yet.

Technology has brought yet another means to experience stories and contribute to learning. Several children's shows now have accompanying podcasts, where the stories from television episodes are recast as audio adventures. If a child already knows the episode, she can identify how the audio version differs. If the stories are new, the podcasts create opportunities for a child to hear rich vocabulary and visualize episodes in her mind. PBS KIDS now has four podcast series – "Pinkalicious & Peterrific," "Odd Squad," "Molly of Denali" and "Arthur" – with more on the way.

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Mosquito Prevention in Your Backyard: What Actually Works?

Itchy mosquito bites can spoil the fun of being outdoors in the summer. Mosquitos aren't just annoying, they can spread diseases like Zika, West Nile virus and Dengue. Here are some strategies for combating these unwelcome pesks.

UNDERSTAND THE BREEDING CYCLE

To effectively control the mosquito population in your backyard, it is important to understand how mosquitos multiply. Females lay their eggs on the inner, wet walls of containers filled with stagnant water. A single female typically lays about 100 eggs at a time. Once the eggs are covered with water, the larvae hatch and feed on microorganisms in the water. Then the larvae go through the pupae stage and develop into adult mosquitoes. This cycle repeats over and over. A key strategy for mosquito control is to interrupt this cycle.

GET RID OF STANDING WATER

The most effective way to rid your yard of mosquitos is to eliminate all sources of standing water. Water can accumulate in plant containers, bird baths, trash cans, toys, plastic pools—anything that holds water. Mosquitos even lay eggs in containers as small as a bottle cap.

Find ways to mosquito proof large containers of standing water that can't be easily emptied. If you have a rain barrel, cover the opening with a fine screen. If you have a pond, stock it with mosquito-eating fish.

PAY ATTENTION TO LANDSCAPING

Don't let your grass and landscaping become overgrown. Mosquitos hide from the heat in overgrown flower beds and tall grass. Some plants in Texas that repel mosquitos are citronella, catnip, lavender, marigolds and basil. Include a few of these plants in pots or beds close to seating areas and near doors.

MAKE A DYI MOSQUITO LARVAE TRAP

Try a homemade mosquito larvae trap as an alternative to spraying your yard. This homemade trap will attract mosquitos and kill larvae after the eggs hatch. It won't harm other insects or animals.



Here's how to make an effective mosquito larvae trap:

- **Gather supplies.** You will need a large bucket, Mosquito Dunk[®] and a handful of grass or hay.
- Fill the bucket half full of water. Mosquitos lay eggs on wet walls of the container so leave some room. The eggs hatch into larvae when covered with water.
- Add a handful of grass or hay. This ferments and creates carbon dioxide to attract female mosquitoes.
- Add a Mosquito Dunk,[®] an inexpensive, small, hard, beige donut-shaped cake that releases a bacterium toxic to mosquito larvae. Each dunk covers up to 100 square feet of water so you can break it into pieces if you like. It lasts for 30 days or more.
- Sink the Mosquito Dunk® (optional). Some people like to sink the mosquito dunk to the bottom to keep it from being taken by a pet or squirrel. Put the dunk in a net bag (like onions come in) and add a rock. Close with string or a twist tie. This will keep the dunk on the bottom of the bucket.
- **Cover the bucket (optional)**. If you have pets who may want to drink out of the bucket, cover it with chicken wire. Don't use a fine screen that might prevent mosquitos from getting in.

Every 30 days or so, add water if needed to keep the bucket half full. You may need to pour out some water after a hard rain. Another option is to drill holes around the top edge of the bucket so it doesn't overflow.

USE INSECT REPELLENT

Even if you dramatically reduce the mosquito population in your backyard, these pesky insects may breed in your neighbor's yard and come over. To prevent mosquito bites, wear clothing that covers the arms and legs. Spray exposed skin with an EPA-registered insect repellent. See sidebar.

Choose an Insect Repellent that Protects Against Diseases Spread by Mosquitos

The Environmental Protection Agency recommends using registered insect repellents to protect against diseases spread by mosquitos. The following ingredients are proven to be safe and effective, even for pregnant and breastfeeding women:

- Deet
- Picaridin
- IR3535
- 2-undecanone

Oil of lemon eucalyptus (OLE) and para-menthane-diol (PMD) are also registered but shouldn't be used on children younger than three years old. Go to www.epa. gov/insect-repellents to learn more.






