





Creating Meaningful Family Memories

My husband and I work long hours. We don't spend much time with our kids. We have a twelve-year-old son and a daughter who is eight. The kids complain that we don't attend school activities as often as other parents. To make matters worse, my sister tells me that we are not taking the time to create family memories. What are family memories? Can they be created or do they just happen? Can you give me some examples? Is it possible to work a lot and still find time to make family memories?

Great questions; you are not alone. Many families struggle to find work and homelife balance and then feel added pressure when it comes to creating lasting family memories.


1. Why are family memories important? Good family memories promote positive emotional health and provide strength in difficult times. Revisiting family memories provides a shared sense of belonging while strengthening relationships between family members.

- Family memories are created by activities shared over time. These memories become part of the oral history/ tradition of the family that gets told and retold over the years.
- 3. Keep activities simple and doable so they can be replicated. Examples of activities you can do now that can generate family memories: adding a special note to a lunch sack, volunteering, weekend adventures visiting different playgrounds around town, reading a favorite book, nature walks, scrapbooking, holiday baking, organizing an annual family activity, or even going to a place to eat regularly.
- 4. Creating family memories can be done on a budget. One busy single mother without money or time, popped a lot of popcorn and held a popcorn fight. My grown daughter and I reminisce about volunteering to teach crafts to the elderly in nursing homes. The key to nurturing family memories is that the activities must be special to your family.

- 5. Be intentional. Put a calendar on the refrigerator. Add family activities. Listen to your kids and if attending something is important to them, do what you can to make it happen. If attending a school activity is important to your kids, do your best to attend. (In response to your original question, here is a cautionary note: never having a parent attend a school event could be traumatic, requiring therapy in adult life.)
- Similar to looking at family photos, sharing family memories helps us feel connected to our family and how we are connected to the world.

Parents or Children: Who is Teaching Whom?

The Learning Curve

I am a mom of three children - boy/ girl twin tweens and a 17-year-olddaughter. I struggled with infertility when my husband and I first started trying for children, which left me with even longer to dream about what parenting our firstborn would be like. I pictured holding and feeding our daughter, teaching her that someone was there to care for her and respond to her needs. I envisioned reading to her and teaching her to tie her shoes through patient instruction. She would try different foods, and we would take family trips to teach her about people and places. As she grew, I would teach her about friendships, love, how to drive, and how to navigate launching into the world as an adult.

Never, though, did I imagine just how much my daughter — and all of my children — would teach me. Little did I know that they would turn me inside out, reshape my heart and mind, and permanently alter who I was as a person. I would be put back together



as something entirely different - wiser, stronger, more patient and empathetic, less selfish, infinitely more tired, but, my goodness, so much better for the whole experience of loving them and being the one they call mom, mama love, mommy, or mooooooooooo, depending upon the mood, or the ask.

The number of things that our children can teach us is seemingly endless and includes:

Patience and self-regulation - Whew! There is nothing more trying than some of the situations we find ourselves in as parents! We are forced, however, to remember that the connection with our child is more important than bulldozing our way to what we want. We step away, take deep breaths, or use other methods to center ourselves and continue dealing with the situation.

Time management and organizationEver try to get out the door for school drop off and/or work all while juggling

hair brushing, breakfast making, lost shoe finding, and dog feeding? Don't get me started on mixing in sporty kids and their early practice dropoffs! If so, then you know how our time management and organizational muscles are forced to grow when we become parents.

Sociability – Especially when our children are younger, we are the masters of their social calendars. If we want our babies to learn sociability, we have to make an effort to greet the other moms at library storytime or the checkout workers at the store. To facilitate our children's social skill development, we host and attend playdates and reach out to other families to form connections. Our kids force us to step outside of our comfort zones so that we model being socially engaged with the world around us.

Creativity and flexibility - Make a rigid plan and your child will quickly unmake it for you with a meltdown,

bathroom stop, sprained ankle, or something else you didn't anticipate. As a parent, you have to adjust on the fly — coming up with fun activities when rain cancels your beach day or turning your restaurant napkin into a canvas for tic-tac-toe.

Negotiation - There is no better negotiator than a tween or teen! Intentional parents become savvy at deciding when to remain firm and where there is room for compromise. The end goal is a child who can make his own decisions and knows how to respectfully advocate for himself, so it is worth it to listen and consider our child's point of view.

Self-reflection - One of the most important things we can do as parents is to notice our reactions to what our children say and do. If our reactions are stronger than warranted, there is likely some underlying baggage that we're bringing to the moment. Parenting requires us to identify what is going on and work through it to ensure that our baggage doesn't become our child's future baggage.

Selflessness - There is not a person among us who gets excited about sleeping with a post-nightmare foot in the ribs, cleaning up endless rounds of vomit, or staying up late to make sure that our teen gets home safely, but we do these things and more without question for these young people that we love. As a parent, you learn to give, and give, and then give some more.

Humility - There is nothing like parenting to knock you down a peg or two. You will feel like you fail over and over, even as you try your hardest to get it "right." In truth, the only way to fail is to not keep trying to do your best for your child. Our kids also learn when we model making mistakes, acknowledge them, and move forward to try again.

New interests - My children have helped me discover new music that I like, I've learned how volleyball is scored, and what constitutes anime. If the local trivia night ever featured questions about French bulldogs or tortoises, I would clean up! Our children

teach us so much about the world when we tune in to what interests them.

Parenting turned out to be so much more than I could have possibly imagined. My daydreams of teaching my children life lessons were only part of the story and not even the best part. What has turned out to be the real gift has been to grow and learn along with them, to let them shape me into

someone who can be an even better mother to them than the person I was before. My children have turned out to be my greatest teachers, and I am so grateful for their lessons.

Awesome Outdoor Adventures

is finally fall in Austin, the season Austinites can walk outdoors without feeling like they stepped into an oven. Austin has a great outdoor culture and you can find fun things to do all over the city. However, now is a great time of year to do something a little more adventurous with your kids, and perhaps even push them to do something new. Whether you still have toddlers, or your kids are nearly as tall as you are, there is sure to be something on our outdoor adventures list that will get them excited!

1. Visit the Troll

Malin's Fountain, a giant troll sculpture located in Pease Park, is fairly new to Austin, installed last spring. The sculpture, created by Danish artist Thomas Dambo, is made with 80% recycled and found material, which makes it a great spot to start up a conversation with your kids about recycling and conservation. To visit the troll head, go to the park entrance

at Kingsbury and Parkway. From there, walk north through Kingsbury Common, then follow the sign that says "Art in the Park." Malin the troll is seated in a wooded area to the left. While you are at the park make sure you stop by the playground at Kingsbury Common and the treehouse immersive art installation, both located steps from the troll. Parking can be sparse, so check out peasepark.org/parking for suggestions on where to park, or public transportation options.

2. Hike McKinney Falls State Park

McKinney Falls State Park is the only state park inside Austin city limits. Located in Southeast Austin, the park offers hiking, biking, camping, fishing, and swimming — all close enough to home to justify a day trip. The park has several easy hiking trails that are great for families and beginner hikers. If the weather is nice you can even swim at the upper or lower falls. Parking is ample, but you may want to make a reservation if you go on a weekend or during a

holiday week as the park reaches maximum capacity quickly during those times.

3. Visit Sweet Eats Farm

Head up to Georgetown for a taste of fall (even if the temperature isn't quite there yet) at the Sweet Eats Farm Fall Festival. We usually think of Sweet Eats during strawberry picking season, but Sweet Eats offers year-round events and their Fall Festival is one of the best. At the Festival you will find a plethora of fall-themed activities including a corn maze, petting zoo, wagon rides, and pig races. Pick out a pumpkin from the giant pumpkin patch with over 40 varieties of pumpkins. Paint it at the festival, or take it home for carving. If you visit on a Friday or Saturday evening you can even catch a fireworks show. Check out the website for a full list of seasonal shows and activities.

4. Zipline Through The Trees

If your kids are thrill-seekers fall is a great time to take them zip-

lining, and there are several spots around Austin to get your fill. Lake Travis Zipline Adventures, Wimberley Zipline Adventures, and Zip Lost Pines all promise a memorable experience zooming among the trees of Central Texas. Lake Travis Zip Lines and Wimberley Zip Lines are geared toward older kids, with weight and age requirements that exclude small children. Zip Lost Pines, however, offers a "Little Zipper Hour" for kids between the ages of 2-15. This special zipline adventure goes a little slower so it's perfect for kids who want to participate, but aren't ready for the full adventure. Be sure to check out all the FAQs before you make a reservation to make sure you and your kids meet all the rider requirements.

5. Play At The All Abilities **Playground**

Round Rock boasts one of the best playgrounds in the Austin Metro area. Play For All Abilities Park truly lives up to its name, with 140,000 square feet of safe and accessible fun. Kids can explore the sensory sandbox, swing on a variety of accessible swings, and make music with the musical elements. Bring a riding toy for your kids to race around the Nyle Maxwell Race Track before you visit Brushy Creek Village, a miniature city where your kids can let their imaginations run wild. If the weather is still hot your kids can cool down under the misters at "Missv's Car Wash." No matter what abilities your kids have or how old they are, they are sure to find something fun to do at the All Abilities Playground!

6. Learn At The Austin Nature and **Science Center**

The Austin Nature and Science Center is an Austin fixture. established in 1960 and tucked into a corner near Zilker Park. The center offers a variety of outdoor activities including trails, a dino pit where you can dig up dinosaur bones from the sand, and a wildlife exhibit. The animals who live at the center are rescued from various situations and cared for by a team of rehabilitation experts. You can see reptiles, owls, a bobcat, and more while walking around the trails. The center also has a Trade Counter where kids can bring in things they found in nature, such as bones or fossils, learn about them, and earn points. They use those points to "buy" something

from the center like shark teeth or shells. If you want to visit the Trade Counter make sure you check the website for accurate open hours as these hours differ from the center's hours

An Interview with Laura McNabb

Austin is bursting with people doing exciting work, and that includes moms who work hard to raise their kids. Every other month, *Austin Family* features a short interview with an Austin mom doing the extraordinary work of parenting.

Austin, meet Laura McNabb.

AF: Tell our *Austin Family* readers a little bit about yourself.

I'm a native Austinite and a graduate of The University of Texas at Austin. My husband and I struggled with infertility and after our kids were born, we made the difficult financial decision that I would be a stay-at-home mom. It has been so fulfilling to serve at their school and I try to be a go-to person for other moms. I try to be a good listener. I like to help. I like to think I'm fun. I love

baking. In October 2023, our family was shaken when my 5-year-old son said: "Jacqueline broke her head open!" In short, my seven, five, and three-year-old were playing behind the camper when the tailgate opened and fell on her head. This month marks a year of learning a lot: miracles happen, and good things can come from bad things.

AF: What is some of the best parenting advice you've received while going through so much as a family?

As someone who likes to care for others, being a family with a very sick child in the ICU, I learned a lot about parenting. Totally out of my comfort zone, I learned and received advice in a triage way. Quick phrases from acquaintances and advice were delivered through the actions of unexpected people. For instance, when I felt overwhelmed as a parent when others asked if they could help, I learned to accept help and just say "thank you." When your family is in need, you may be surprised how help arrives. As a native Austinite, I was surprised that much of the support we received was from Californians, as a Texan this really surprised me. Don't shield your kids from learning from tragic situations, they will build grit. Reflect with kids about how they were helped amid difficult times and teach them to participate in helping other families in the future. Now when we participate in meal trains, they get it!

AF: Who has been a role model for you as a mom?

The moms at my kids' school. They showed up by just helping. They

didn't ask what they could do, because they knew that I would just say, "It's ok, we've got it," instead they were women of action by picking up the kids from school, making lunches, delivering gift cards, bringing healthy foods like salad to the house, and anticipated my needs by bringing trail mix and pad thai so I could eat something comforting in the hospital.

AF: What's the best thing about your kids at this stage?

Going through a family tragedy, that all three kids experienced, has made them all stronger. The kids have been able to share their thoughts with the school counselors and overcome their guilt from the freak accident that could have taken Jacqueline's life. All three kids are tough and resilient. I also learned that Jacqueline is super strong. Daily, I love seeing the fun things through their eyes and how they talk about things in their own unique ways.

AF: What are a few good things about raising kids in Austin?

So much nature, Wild Basin Preserve Hills feels like a mountain to my kids where they love discovering bugs.

AF: If you had known then what you know now, what would you have worried about less as you entered parenting?

You can do everything right and still have everything can get out of control. Dark and scary places in life can have breadcrumbs of good things.


AF: What do you love these days about being a mom?

- Add features: draw a face on the handprint with markers or crayons. You can also add hair using yarn or strips of paper.
